## *let's saturate Fayette County with the gospel*

Then said [Jesus] to his disciples, “The harvest truly is plentiful, but the laborers are few; Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he will send forth laborers into his harvest.”

*Matthew 9:37-38*

### **THE HARVEST IS PLENTIFUL**

Jesus taught that the harvest is plentiful (large). The harvest would be those people ready to hear and receive the gospel. The people are everyday people taking care of everyday business who are ready to receive the good news Jesus preached.

The majority of the harvest are still in the fields. They do not attend any denomination, nor do they listen to the radio or YouTube videos to learn about Jesus. They need someone to speak to them. If there is not someone to share with them, they will never hear the good news Jesus came to declare. If they do not hear the good news, they cannot receive the good news. The Apostle Paul explains this in Romans 10:13-14:

For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher?

If the majority in Fayette County is going to hear the good news that Jesus shared, they need someone to go to where they are to share it with them. If you claim the name of Christ, that someone is you.

### **THE LABORERS ARE FEW**

By encouraging us to ask for more laborers, Jesus indicates there must be more Christians out in the fields laboring to bring in the harvest. Most of the harvest is in the marketplaces and public squares. If the majority are going to be reached, the laborers must go to where the harvest is. We must also be in the marketplaces and public squares preaching on the street corners, holding signs, and distributing tracts wherever we go. Jesus' last command to his disciples—you and me—echoes this when Jesus commanded in Mark 16:15:

“Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature.”

Let's make this verse relevant to our community:

“Go ye into all of Fayette County and preach the gospel to every creature.”

This is Jesus' command for all his followers: to saturate our communities with the gospel; that includes you. Going into the marketplaces and public squares has nothing to do with your spiritual gifts, denominational focus, or occupation in life.
